But it was also a war where images changed public opinion - images such as this by Nic Ut of nine-year-old Kim Phuc.

On 8 June 1972 a South Vietnamese aircraft accidentally dropped its napalm payload on the village of Trang Bang.

With her clothes on fire, Kim Phuc ran out of the village with her family to be airlifted to hospital.

She survived and now lives in Canada.



Perhaps the most recognised picture from the war is this by Eddie Adams.

It shows the South Vietnamese General Nguyen Ngoc Loan executing a Viet Cong officer with a single shot to the head.

Photographs do not tell the whole truth, however. The prisoner had just killed at least eight people, which is what led Gen Loan to carry out the execution.

The image was to change the public perception of the war and haunted Gen Loan until his death.

This was the first helicopter war.

Troops could be rapidly moved to anywhere in the country, ensuring the amount of combat seen by soldiers during a year's tour was far higher than during World War II.

Terror at KSU

A crowd of about 1,000 people gathered on the campus of Kent State University today for a protest against the Vietnam War. The protesters, many of whom were armed with rifles and shotguns, were ordered to disperse by the National Guard. The police used tear gas and live ammunition, killing four and wounding 10.

Campus Is Evacuated

The campus of Kent State University was evacuated today after a riot broke out. The National Guard was called in to restore order. The riot resulted in the deaths of four students and the wounding of 10 others. The campus was closed for several days.

Kerry Raps Nixon for Cambodia Action

Sen. Edward Brooke (R-Mass.) today sharply criticized President Nixon's handling of the Vietnam War, particularly his decision to send troops to Cambodia. He accused the president of a "policy of escalation" and called for a withdrawal of American forces.
